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# Keep Bird Feeders Clean

Please help prevent the spread of illness in birds by cleaning feeders regularly (once a week) with a solution of nine parts water to one part bleach. Clean up below the feeders to remove feces and hulls which can become moldy, wet, or spoiled. Another suggestion is to offer several feeders so there is less opportunity for birds to touch and contaminate each other. The best supplement is to plant native trees, bushes, and plants that offer berries, insects, nuts, and seeds.

Birdbaths need to be rinsed and scrubbed with a solution of nine parts water and one part vinegar. Residues of soaps and cleaners can strip essential oils off feathers. We recommend changing the water at least every other day and more frequently if needed. Place the birdbath away from the feeders to avoid debris and seeds mucking up the water.

Finally, please increase the cleaning schedule if you suspect a disease is lurking by. Our feathered friends will thank you for your efforts. —*Diana Beck*

# Lori Amends' Paradise in the City

My yard is a little over an acre; it's my paradise in the city. Behind my yard is a city retention pond and behind that is the Fond du Lac River and a new park, the Greenway Arboretum.

I feel a responsibility to the urban plants and wildlife that are trying to eke out a living here in my small urban landscape. I work on getting rid of buckthorn, garlic mustard, Canadian thistle, and burdock. I try not to mow some of my grass until June (No-Mow May), so wildlife have a place to eat, hide, and nest. I have birdfeeders by many vines (trumpet, bittersweet, grape, and clematis) and I plant annual vines (morning glory, beans, and peas) for birds to feed and nest. This spring, there was a mourning dove nest in my tangle of trumpet vines.

My flowers start in February/March with crocus and do not end until a hard frost. This helps bees and bugs in the early spring and I never use pesticides. In the summer, I know rabbits and woodchucks will eat from my garden and I

am happy to share. The blackberries, elderberries, and mulberries ripen and attract many kinds of birds to the feast. I have to be fast to pick a couple bags for myself. I also have two small ponds with fountains for birds, fish, and frogs.

In May and June, red-tailed hawks nest by the pond and will be busy feeding their baby. If you take a walk through the Greenway, you will hear it begging (screaming) for food. Check out the power lines above the pond and you might see the kingfisher watching for a meal, or one of the many egrets and herons fishing from the banks. I work a lot, so the yard is not as neat as I would like, but this has a benefit for wildlife. I keep lots of plants standing through the winter—not only for winter interest, but for bugs to spend the winter. We heat with

wood, so there are woodpiles and some brush year-round as places to nest and hide. Pine trees provide good cover for birds and are beautiful in the snow.

Everyone can be a habitat hero by keeping invasive plants out. Even in a small area, you can have a small tabletop fountain, a birdbath, and a birdfeeder.
