Pollinators in Peril: How Can We Help? Wednesday, March 8, 7 pm, MPTC, Room B124

Charlie "CharBee" Koenen has been passionately preaching about pollinator peril for more than 20 years. His experience includes former State Bee Inspector, inventor of a vented top bar hive system, Director of SE Wisconsin Honey Producers, educator, advocate, and longtime bee slinger for the largest honey bee distribution operation in the country. His Beesentation looks at the role of honey bees, then focuses attention on the rest of the pollinators that brought abundance and diversity to our world. Wisconsin is home to more than 500 species of bees and only one makes honey; most are single moms that helped make our native plants. Find out ways we can bee the change.

Thru-Hiking Wisconsin's Ice Age Trail Wednesday, April 12, 7 pm, MPTC, Room B124

Recently retired as the Director of Sheboygan's Maywood Environmental Park, David Kuckuk has had a long-time interest in environmental education and natural resources. In 1998, he and his Siberian Husky companion, Yukon, began a unique educational expedition starting at St. Croix Falls State Park. Their 1,000-mile journey along the Ice Age Trail vicariously involved students across Wisconsin through their web page and in-person stops at select schools. Upon completion at Potawatomi State Park, Yukon was inducted into the Wisconsin Veterinarian Association Pet Hall of Fame. Stories, pictures, and items used on this exciting adventure will be shared in this program.

Whooping Cranes in Wisconsin

Wednesday, May 10, 7 pm, MPTC, Room B124 In the 1940s Whooping Cranes, once native to Wisconsin, faced near extinction as a result of increased threats from habitat loss, hunting, and more. It wasn't until 2001 that Whooping Cranes returned to the eastern United States following a collaborative reintroduction program led by the International Crane Foundation (ICF). Today, around 75 Whooping Cranes will spend their summers in Wisconsin's wetlands each year. Please join Stephanie Schmidt, Whooping Crane Outreach Coordinator for the International Crane Foundation, to learn about the Whooping Cranes of Wisconsin and the work ICF and crane conservation partners are doing to safeguard their future. Following this

presentation, you will be able to identify Whooping Cranes by sight and sound, understand the historic threats toward Whooping Cranes that led to their decline, know the ins and outs of the reintroduction program, and the current work crane conservation partners are doing to protect cranes in Wisconsin and throughout their flyways. Find out how you can be an ambassador for cranes in Wisconsin.

Be Part of "No Mow May"

Starting in Great Britain and spreading to Appleton, Wisconsin, a movement called "No Mow May" has taken hold in several Wisconsin communities in the last few years. The big reason to participate is to help the early native pollinators get started in the spring. Research has shown that one in four pollinators are imperiled.

Not mowing allows early flowers to grow and help the bees emerging from hibernation. Does it make a difference? Studies have already shown that "No Mow May" lawns had five times the number of native bees and three times the bee species compared to mowed areas.

The easiest part of your participation is the fact that you don't have to do a thing, but remember it is only for one month. What can you do beyond May to help protect the bees? Perhaps plant bushes and flowers that offer pollen and nectar? And even mow less frequently during the summer?

Inform your neighbors with a yard sign that lets them know that you are observing "No Mow May," or helping the early bees. —*Diana Beck*
