Conservation Camp Scholarships

Fond du Lac County Audubon, through the Dave Stetter Environmental Education funds, provided four camp scholarships for the Wisconsin Land and Water Conservation Camp at Upham Woods near Wisconsin Dells. These funds are offered in the name of Dave Stetter, Goodrich High School science teacher and long-time Audubon member, to promote handson outdoor education experiences for Fond du Lac County youth. The camp from June 14-17, 2023, offered outdoor education experiences that fostered an understanding and appreciation of nature consistent with the goals of our Environmental Education funds.

The four middle school students who received scholarships are:

Jude Bonzelet is a seventh grade student at Treffert Way School in North Fond du Lac. Jude describes himself as an inquisitive animal lover. Like Audubon members, he likes birding. He would like to join or start an environmental club at his school.

Jacob S. Chamberlain is a sixth grade student also at Treffert Way School in North Fond du Lac. Jacob loves the outdoors and birdwatching is one of his favorite things. His teachers describe him as a INTERNATIO very comfortable and experienced public speaker, and we hope he talks about FOUNDAT the camp to other students.

Lincoln Gustavus is a sixth grade student at Woodworth Middle School where he participates in the following clubs: Rocket, Science, Robotic, and Coding. Lincoln has successfully caught and raised Monarch caterpillars for release. He hopes to one day have a career in a science-related field.

Hollis McDermott is a sixth grade student at STEM academy in Fond du Lac. Hollis loves nature, especially aquatic life including fish, frogs, and plants. Recently he has been studying the amphibian axolotls. Hollis wants to become a marine biologist. The students received awards at the May Audubon meeting.

Tom Schultz is a native of Fond du Lac who now lives near Green Lake. His illustrations have appeared in several editions of National Geographic's Field Guide to Birds of North America, and in the Smithsonian Institution's Warblers field guide. The Fond du Lac Audubon Board has yet to decide how to market these lovely prints that capture the beauty of birds in their natural setting. Winter Wonderland at Kay's Ledge Saturday, December 9, 1 pm, N7836 Cty Road WH

Explore this private property along the Niagara Escarpment during the early winter. David Kuckuk, long time environmental educator and former director of Sheboygan's Maywood Environmental Park, will lead a hike that focuses on trees in the winter and if possible, animal tracks in the snow. The hike will last about two hours. Afterward, the group is invited to gather around a bonfire for some hot chocolate. No dogs will be allowed.

Dress warmly (warm boots, etc). Snowshoes or Yaktrax are helpful if there is snow or ice, and ski poles help with balance. Drive east on Cty WH .9 miles from the 151 bypass to the entrance on the west side of Cty WH. Watch for an Audubon sign. Canceled if raining.

Bees and Beneficial Pollinator Species Wednesday, January 10, 7 pm, MPTC, Room O215

Joel Clary, Pegasus Farm's beekeeper and Keith Bancroft of Kele Alpacas, will present on bees and beneficial pollinator species in Northeast Wisconsin. Both men are affiliated with Furrows to Fences, Inc., a 501c3 nonprofit that provides educational events on small-scale farming using draft horses, specifically Percheron horses, and provides chemical-free garden plots to the community.
