Our room will be B141. People can park in the B lot on the north side of MPTC and enter door B3.



Crane Foundation Trip Report

A group from Fond du Lac traveled via wheelchair van to the International Crane Foundation (ICF) near Baraboo on September 21 to attend its Annual Membership Appreciation Day, which is highlighted by behind-the-scenes access to ICF facilities for members and their guests. Upon arrival, we browsed the gift shop (one can never have enough cranerelated jewelry and gear!) as we waited for the guided tours to begin. Our tour included about one-third of the fifteen crane species occurring worldwide. The ICF has representatives of each of these species in captivity, with a female/male pair of each on display in spacious outdoor enclosures reflecting each species' specific habitat, with painted backdrops. For example, the black-necked cranes from the Tibetan region of Asia have a Himalayan Mountain backdrop. We learned about the biology and ecology of the cranes, and the ICF's efforts at worldwide crane protection and habitat restoration and preservation. We heard a few cranes calling in the distance, a behavior called bugling, which is why the ICF newsletter is called The Bugle. We next visited the veterinary clinic (not usually open to the public), where we learned about the cranes' diets, parasites, diseases, and techniques used by the ICF staff to provide enrichment for the cranes, a necessity when attempting to successfully maintain animals in captivity.

A potentially severe rainstorm came through in late afternoon, requiring the ICF to cancel the remaining events, so we could not visit Crane City, where many more cranes are housed for breeding, raising the chicks, and serves as a gene bank for the world's cranes. Overall, it was a very enjoyable and informative trip, and we hope to do this again next year. The public can visit the ICF most weekdays and some Saturdays. Conservation Camp Scholarships

These funds are offered in the name of Dave Stetter, Goodrich High school science teacher and long-time Audubon member, to promote handson outdoor education experiences for Fond du Lac County youth. The camps foster an understanding and appreciation of nature consistent with the goals of our Environmental Education funds.

Hayden Tate is a student at Woodworth Middle School where she participates in Rocket Club and Coding Club. Hayden loves learning about animals and the environment with hopes to help both.

Managing Massive Fish in the Winnebago System

Wednesday, January 8, 7 pm, MPTC, Room B141

The Winnebago system lake sturgeon population is one of the best managed sturgeon populations in the world, supporting the largest harvest season available for this species through the winter spear fishery. But maintaining a population of a fish that grows to the be the size of a human on a system that includes 131,000 acres of lake and over 300 miles of rivers requires close management, diligent work, and a little creativity. Discover the science and techniques used to ensure that this population continues to thrive while preserving one of the most unique outdoor recreational opportunities in the nation.

Margaret has been in the fisheries field for the last 12 years in Detroit, Vermont, Texas, and Wisconsin working with native fish restoration and sports fish management. She has always been passionate about *Acipenseriformes* (sturgeon and paddlefish) and is excited to give people a glimpse into the life of this dinosaur-like fish.
