Small World, Large Impact Audubon-Style Part One

Most people likely have had 'small world' moments—for example, you moved far from where you grew up to find your new neighbor is related to someone back home. Here I share one of my 'small world' episodes involving members of our Audubon group, the father of one of these, and a significant contribution to a scientific field.

I'm not a Wisconsinite. My main awareness of the state other than as 'America's Dairyland' came from my dad talking with his buddies about making that dream trip in quest of those fabled muskies! Prior to moving here, I lived in Gainesville, Florida, for about 40 years with my partner, Lou Rea Kenyon (currently an Audubon Board member). I was a professor at the University of Florida and Lou Rea was a nurse practitioner and state/federally permitted wildlife rehabilitator caring for injured and orphaned animals and researching their nutritional requirements. Due to disabilities I retired early and we moved to Rosendale to live on Lou Rea's five-generational family farm where she was born and raised. Unfortunately, the farmhouse could not be made wheelchair accessible, so we purchased a house nearby. Progressing disabilities required me to move to St. Francis nursing home where I now reside.

Last year, Lou Rea suffered a stroke resulting in hospitalization, followed by a stay at St. Francis for therapy before returning home. During one of my visits to her room, Lou Rea already had guests, namely Diana Beck, our Board President, and Mary Ellen McMeen (our group's 'delightful dandelion lady'). Diana's last name sounded somewhat familiar, and then I realized I had interacted with the late Dr. Stan D. Beck, when I had a temporary position at the University of Wisconsin in Madison in 1978–1979 where he was an eminent professor. I mentioned this to Diana and sure enough, Dr. Beck was her father—talk about a small world and by a very circuitous route!

But there's more to this story—because of Dr. Beck's own research and authority, he was pivotal in assisting a colleague and me to make a major contribution to the field of entomology (insects) as I will describe in Part Two of this essay (scheduled for the winter issue of our newsletter).

Community Shopping Night Thursday, December 4, 10 am-5 pm, Just Fare Market



Taxonomy, Natural History and Conservation of Wisconsin Fireflies Wednesday, October 8, 7 pm, MPTC, Room B141

Join Dr. Daniel K. Young, UW-Madison Professor of Entomology for a brief, comparative definition of what we mean by firefly, followed by an overview of the Wisconsin fauna. A current Wisconsin species list forms the backbone of generic overviews for each of our seven genera. The presentation then examines the general concept of bioluminescence throughout the greater tree of life, how biological light is produced in fireflies, and its evolution and significance with respect to the biology and natural history of fireflies. Lastly, a few comments are offered relating to an observed general decline in firefly populations in many parts of North America, along with a few notes on firefly conservation.

Audubon Conservation Ranching (ACR) aims to work with graziers to enhance habitat on working lands through a new certification program. This successful program from the western U.S. has been implemented by Audubon in Wisconsin.

MEET THE BOARD


Diana Beck, President
