
A FUN FAMILY PROGRAM Crazy Cold-Blooded Creatures

AUDUBON FIELD TRIPS

Whooping Crane Observation & Festival

Saturday, September 14, 5:15 am to 5:00 pm Berlin Conservation Club, W898 Whiteridge Road, Berlin



Celebrate and support the ongoing efforts of Operation Migration to save the endangered whooping crane from extinction. Operation Migration has been using ultralight planes to guide whoopers on their southern migration since 2001,

and this festival supports that effort. Start the day with a sunrise viewing of cranes training with Operation Migration aircraft at White River Marsh State Wildlife area on Highway D and Mile Road. Visit with "craniacs" as you watch the aircraft and cranes fly overhead. Bring binoculars and cameras. This part of the day depends on favorable weather conditions for the ultra-light planes. Then drive to the Berlin Conservation Club for a pancake breakfast at the Crane Festival. In addition to food, venders, and conservation displays, the festival highlights four speakers: Joe Duff, co-founder of Operation Migration; John French, USGS Patuxent Wildlife Research Center; Tom Schultz, Wisconsin Society for Ornithology; and Pat Fisher, Raptor Rehabilitation. Meet at the southwest corner of Menard's parking lot at 5:15 am to form a carpool to White River Marsh or drive over on your own. Bring as many people with you as you can for some or all of this educational experience. Admission to the Crane Festival is free, but a \$5.00 per vehicle parking fee is charged. When Dwight Weiser described early Native American artifacts visible on the Niagara Escarpment at our 2011 annual banquet, members requested a field trip to view these findings. Dwight has documented these phenomena and other mysteries of the Ledge in his book, *Secrets of the Ledge*. Join Dwight for a short walk to the Ledge to spot some possible archeoastronomy phenomena. Dwight will explain sight lines and some Native American lore about what we see. Bring a compass if you have one. Mecan River Paddle

Saturday, October 5, 9 am to 4 pm, Princeton Search for wildlife in Germaine Marsh, portage a

small dam and paddle down the river for two to three hours. The Mecan is one of central Wisconsin's finest rivers and flows through mostly undeveloped land. There are many opportunities for wildlife viewing. The carpool will meet at 9 am in the southwest corner of the Menard's parking lot on Hwy 23. We will drive to the Mecan River Outfitters, just west of Princeton. Participants who bring their own canoe or kayak will pay a \$20.00 shuttle fee. For those renting

- a canoe will cost \$45.00 and a kayak \$34.00. This includes the shuttle. The outfitters will take us to the drop-off site and pick us up at a designated bridge three hours later. Lunch or snacks can be brought along for a stop on the way. We expect to return to Fond du Lac about 4 pm. Call to make a reservation by October 1.

2013 Buckthorn Removal Schedule

Our wild areas need help! European Buckthorn can grow so dense, that even garlic mustard has trouble growing in a buckthorn thicket. If we do nothing, eventually there is only bare soil under buckthorn and this leads to erosion as well as very poor habitat for birds and other wildlife.

Our removal sessions accommodate a variety of physical abilities. No experience is necessary. Baby buckthorn need to be pulled out by hand. Young trees are levered out of the ground (including roots) by using extractagators and shovels. Large trees are girdled with an axe. We also do some trimming with loppers and then drag the brush into piles.

Bring garden gloves. Wear sturdy shoes, long pants and a long sleeved shirt. Equipment is provided. Sessions run from 9 to 11 am. *Meet by the Peebles Trail bridge east of Prairie Road*. If late, walk east down the trail to find the group. The last session is at Hobbs Woods. Cancelled if steady or heavy rain.
